It's hard to imagine that it's been almost two years since I first arrived in Victoria. My wife and I were just talking the other day about the long drive back home to Texas from Nevada. It's certainly good to be back in the Lone Star state and living out in the country.

Here at the Zoo, there has been a lot of changes thanks to the support of the City of Victoria. In 2022, we were awarded \$500,000 in ARPA funding for renovation and restoration of the Zoo. Needless to say, we have been seriously busy.

Over the past two years we have renovated both the Ocelot and Jaguar exhibits, replaced a quarter of the power grid in the Zoo, and restored the train caboose so that we can turn it into an educational encounter space.

In addition, we just finished working with Felis Consulting and they have provided us with a master plan that will guide the Zoo to a new future. Having worked on several master plans in my career, this is the most advanced design I have ever seen.

Currently we are renovating our Black bear exhibit, upgrading our landscaping, power washing, and then painting and staining throughout the Zoo. We even found time to renovate the Eagle exhibit and the Education Station that we use for presentations.

The Zoo team has been training, taking continuing education classes and we even hosted a regional workshop for the Safe Capture Chemical Anesthesia team from the San Diego Zoo Wildlife Alliance Academy, which our staff attended.

Speaking of our staff, the Wildlife Department continues to move forward with animal training to facilitate exams and treatment by our new veterinarian, Dr. Tim Tristin. He has been an incredible addition to our team with his years of exotic animal experience.

Our special events have really stepped up, last spring we had our best Wild About Wine ever; And we just finished Haunted Zoo and Zoo Boo for the kids. The feedback was incredible, many patrons were saying this was the best Haunted Zoo ever!

I must go for now, but it's always great to catch up with our supporters.

Education

In Fiscal Year 2023, we had over 5,382 students come to the Zoo on school field trips. Our Education team went out to 23 schools and met with 1,000's of students and they also held four interactive Summer Camps.

We also hosted the Loop Abroad program for students that aspire to become veterinarians. This remarkable program has been a fixture at the Texas Zoo and every summer we host a different group of students each week here at our facility.

And of course, our staff presents daily Keeper Chats to our patrons. This gives an indepth look into the lives of our animals and their personal stories while providing details into their biology, husbandry, and conservation efforts in the wild places of our planet.

Wildlife

The Texas Zoo was happy to take part in this new endeavor to help further animal medicine. We were delighted to have Dr. Scott Pless on site this past month to gather valuable data for this new software that is being created called SnootScan, a Universal Animal Facial ID.

Imagine walking up to any animal (cat, dog, zoo animal, wildlife, etc.) and using an iPhone to scan them just like Apple FaceID, to retrieve their name, owner information, and medical records.

SnootScan was invented by Dr. Scott Pless, DVM and is currently under active development for launch in the US veterinary market in coordination with Center Point Bio-Tech.

SnootScan uses artificial intelligence and sophisticated 3D imaging techniques to create 3D holograms of animal faces with the goal to create an international registry to access any individual animal.

The technology allows for any user with an iPhone or iPad to create a "fingerprint" facial scan of the animal's face. SnootScan utilizes Ai to account for use through animal cages, muddy noses, wet noses, and more!

Our goal is to build the best small zoological facility in North America that will attract patrons from across our region and allow us to support endangered species.
